

WHAT YOU DO?



- You must preregister and receive confirmation before attending the church service (Remember: It is easier to reserve a seat during weekday masses)
- You do not go to a church service if you are infected or ill (even in case of mild symptoms)



- Both right outside and within the church, you must keep a distance of at least one meter between yourself and anyone not in your household
- You must use a disinfectant (antibac) before you enter the church and before you receive communion
- You must follow the directives of the church usher
- You must not shake hands with anyone
 - You cough or sneeze into your elbow or a paper tissue that you subsequently dispose of
- You are not obliged to receive communion if you are worried about getting infected





WHAT HAPPENS BETWEEN SERVICES?



- Frequent and thorough cleaning with water and detergents is carried out
- There will be extra cleaning of all surfaces and points of contact in the church
- There will be extra cleaning in the restrooms
- Hymn books will be removed



WHAT DOES THE PRIEST DO?



- The priest is careful about good hand hygiene before, during, and after the service
- The priest performs extra hygiene measures before and during the distribution of communion



- The priest is responsible for making sure that good and systematic cleaning of the church is carried out between services
- The priest must not celebrate if he is infected or ill (even in case of mild symptoms)

WHAT DOES THE CHURCH USHER DO?



- Makes sure that only people who have preregistered are allowed access to the church service
- Is responsible for making sure that no more than 50 people attend the church service at any given time. This is in addition to those who are ministering



- Ensures that everyone uses a disinfectant spray (antibac)
- Ensures that the rule of keeping a distance of at least one meter between people is observed during the entire church service
- Makes sure hymn books are not available
